
An Order for Morning Prayer

The Psalms

Sung antiphonally beginning with low voices.




- 1 Come, let us sing to the LORD; *

- 2 Let us come before his presence with thanksgiving * and raise a loud shout / to him with psalms.
- 3 For the LORD is a great God, * and a great King a/bove all gods.
- 4 In his hand are the caverns of the earth, * and the heights of the hills are / his also.
- 5 The sea is his, for he made it, *
 and his hands have molded / the dry land.
- 6 Come, let us bow down, and bend the knee, * and kneel before the LORD / our Maker.
- 7 For he is our God, and we are the people of his pasture and the sheep of his hand. *
 Oh, that today you would hear/ken to his voice!
- 8 Harden not your hearts, as your forebears did in the wilderness, * at Meribah, and on that day at Massah, when / they tempted me.

- 9 They put me to the test, * though they / had seen my works.
- 10 Forty years long I detested that generation and said, * "This people are wayward in their hearts; they do / not know my ways."
- 11 So I swore in my wrath, * "They shall not enter / into my rest." [Ant.]
- Glory to the Father, and to the /Són,* AllAnd to the /Holy Spirit: As it was in the beginning, is /nów,* And will be forev/er. Amen.

All stand with the Officiant to sing the Canticle.







The Apostles' Creed

All remain standing and say together:

AllI believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

A Collect for the Third Sunday of Lent

Almighty God, you know that we have no power in ourselves to help ourselves: Keep us both outwardly in our bodies and inwardly in our souls, that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**.


A Collect for Guidance
